“Going Steady?”

In our ideal of being complete students, we face many difficulties, problems, and obstacles. These tribulations can take many forms and hideous shapes. We, as students, and especially as students of Jesuit, often find ourselves being caught up in a vast whirlpool of trials over which we have little or no control. One such problem which has perplexed high school students for quite a few years now is a social dilemma, that of "going steady." The FLYER, after having been approached to express an editorial opinion on the whole situation of "going steady," has tried to keep in mind that each student is an individual and his views might not agree with the next fellow's on this rather touchy subject. We will try to give an opinion as fair as possible, and an indicative opinion of students as we can.

To begin with, the morality of "going steady" is very controversial. It is based on many opinions by many people and can be argued about all day. To say that all of the arguments against "going steady" are wrong would be just about as foolish as saying that all of them are right.

The FLYER believes, in effect, that the arguments against "going steady" are right; but, we are firmly opposed to a few main points of arguments that some of our boys are against "going steady" uphold. One of these fallacies is: no matter who the boy or girl are, no matter what they have been caught they will eventually fall into sin, and in most cases serious sin. Any self-respecting student who is trying to lead a good Catholic life should be appalled at the naïveté of such a statement. This statement says that parental training, good morals, religious training all mean nothing. If this be the case, then why are we placed here on earth?

Secondly, we also contend that some discretion should be used before condemning this social practice. Both parties should be thoroughly interviewed before a decision is reached. To denounce the requirement lightly could have a disastrous effect on some teenagers.

Admittedly, this is a general rule for most teenagers. It is detrimental to the development of their personalities to "go steady." We are in full agreement with that; however, has it ever occurred to you that perhaps you "going steady" is detrimental to the personalities of some couples? Some young people are not suited to "play the field" and are miserable doing it. Unhappily all of the lovers we come down to this opinion. If the boy and girl are about to be or are already "going steady" come to an agreement, whether it is to date each other, or not, then it should be up to them to carry out their decision.

"Going steady" for most young people is wrong; for others it is necessary, but to be in it is subject to a self-imposed rule which is supposed to hold for all situations. It is an object that requires an open mind and a great deal of understanding, but it is also a problem which most students will have to face on the road to becoming complete students.
