Fair Park Succumbs Under Flyer Ace Attaway, 4-1

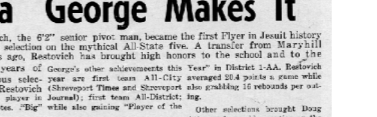
