But the true purpose of any accredited high school is preparing a person for college in order that he may be a success physically, intellectually, and spiritually in the world of today. This ideal is fulfilled by acquiring a well-balanced knowledge of languages, both foreign and native, the sciences, social studies, mathematics, and Christian doctrine.

At times it seems hard, almost impossible, to "fit the books"; but all of us must realize that our grades, including various achievement tests taken throughout our tenure at Jesuit, are the main qualifications we possess when we enter the world of work. If we don't have the grades to back up our intelligence, we might well become a charter member of "Tropic City."

This also holds true for an individual possessing athletic ability. Over the last decade, many athletic scholarships required possession of at least a C average. All of us cannot attain the Princeton Honor Roll, nor possess high averages, but we can develop our gifts to their fullest extent in furthering ourselves.

I have been talking in abstract terminology; now I will relate some proven study helps which will allow you to use your time to its best advantage.

A well-lighted room, a safe place to study each night, and freedom from outside interference, such as the radio or TV, give an atmosphere conducive to proper concentration.

But the next step is the main obstacle, actually studying the lessons.

Many teachers recommend getting a notebook for each class. This has proved beneficial in most cases. In this way students go home, learn the main points the teacher discussed in class, and go on to another subject, while the teacher does not keep a notebook would have to refer constantly to his textbook, thus wasting time on things of minor importance.

Setting up a schedule every night is a tremendous advantage. This schedule allows a certain amount of time for each subject. If you do finish a certain lesson on the next day, then, after finishing your entire assignment, complete the unfinished one. When making this schedule, put your most difficult subject first, so that you may "kick it" when you are freshest and better able to concentrate.

With these suggestions you have the instruments to better yourself by knowledge through education. Interested? The choice is yours.
